

The Adm n strat on's chaot c, ncoherent, lo c-defy n res onse to the moshealth cr s s to befall the country n a century w ll have dr ven the res dent

When the C VID-1 andem c struck the nat on n March, the Adm n strat d rect on s nce the E y t an army dec ded to take a shortcut across the Red 5

Even as ubl c health ex erts ra sed alarms, the res dent d sm ssed the v rus as no worse than seasonal flu, followed by h s assurances that t would run ts course by the t me warmer weather arr ved and there was no need to take rotect ve ste s.

Granted, many others bes desthe res dent nt ally m sread the otent alm act of the athoen and were late n react n as ts sever ty became more a arent.

It was Trum, thou h, who do edly stuck to h s v ew that the threat was m n mal and tem orary, s r nkl n h s comments and tweets w th assurances that a vacc ne was mm nent, that the country had turned the corner, and that h s Adm n strat on had done an exem lary job n combatt n the andem c.

He ns sted that bus nesses and schools could and should be re-o ened and rout nel fe resumed.

It was all at str k n odds w th the real l fe ex er ence of a fearful o ulace: more than e ht m ll on eo le nfected, a roach n a quarter m ll on dead and red ct ons of an even reater toll.

Trum n the meant mer d culed h s Adm n strat on's ubl c health and nfect ous d sease exerts, reject n the r adv ce and refus n to heed the r warn n s.

He romoted un roven treatments and scorned those who wore rotect ve masks n ubl c, su est n they were cowards and weakl n s.

Even after he and h s w fe were nfected, he told the Amer can eo le there was noth n to be afra d of and they should not allow the llness to dom nate the r l ves.

At a cruc alt me when the nat on looked to h m for leadersh , h s act ons were an ncred ble den al of real ty. Amer cans saw fam ly members, relat ves, fr ends and co-workers fall v ct m to the v rus wh le the r res dent ns sted there was noth n to worry about.

Parents were concerned about the r ch ldren, fearful that des te the youn er o ulat on's reater res stance to the v rus, they were not mmortal. The death of a ch ld was too a nful to contem late and they wanted some assurance, some ho e that overnmental leaders were br n n every resource available and enl st n every ex ert to rotect them.

Instead, Trum embraced a theory romoted by a neurorad olo st w th no back round or exert sen nfect ous d seases that those most at r sk—the elderly and those w th underly new med calcond tons—be solated and rotected while the remainder of the original ulation be exposed, infected and treated, row different what stermed "herd mmunity."

The theory holds that ven suff c ent t me susce t b l ty w ll van sh and the v rus w ll s m ly d e o from a lack of v ct ms.

It sastunn n a roach, border n on off calcr m nalne l ence — Darw n smrun amok. Ex erts warn that otent ally hundreds of thousands would deneedlessly, sacr f ced n serv ce of a cockeyed un roven theory that more ro erly belon s nasc ence f ct on f lm.

The Adm n strat on handl n of the andem c has been abysmal — lethally abysmal — ran n from den al to outr ht falsehoods and wacky cons racy theor es.

To be sure, the res dent and the nat on confronted an un recedented cr s s for which there was no history or exiet ence to u deares onse.

It s, thou h, rec sely n t mes l ke th s that leaders lead, that stron ersonal t es ste forward, rov de an aura of calm and com etence, and reassure eo le that the r safety and rotect on s aramount.
